



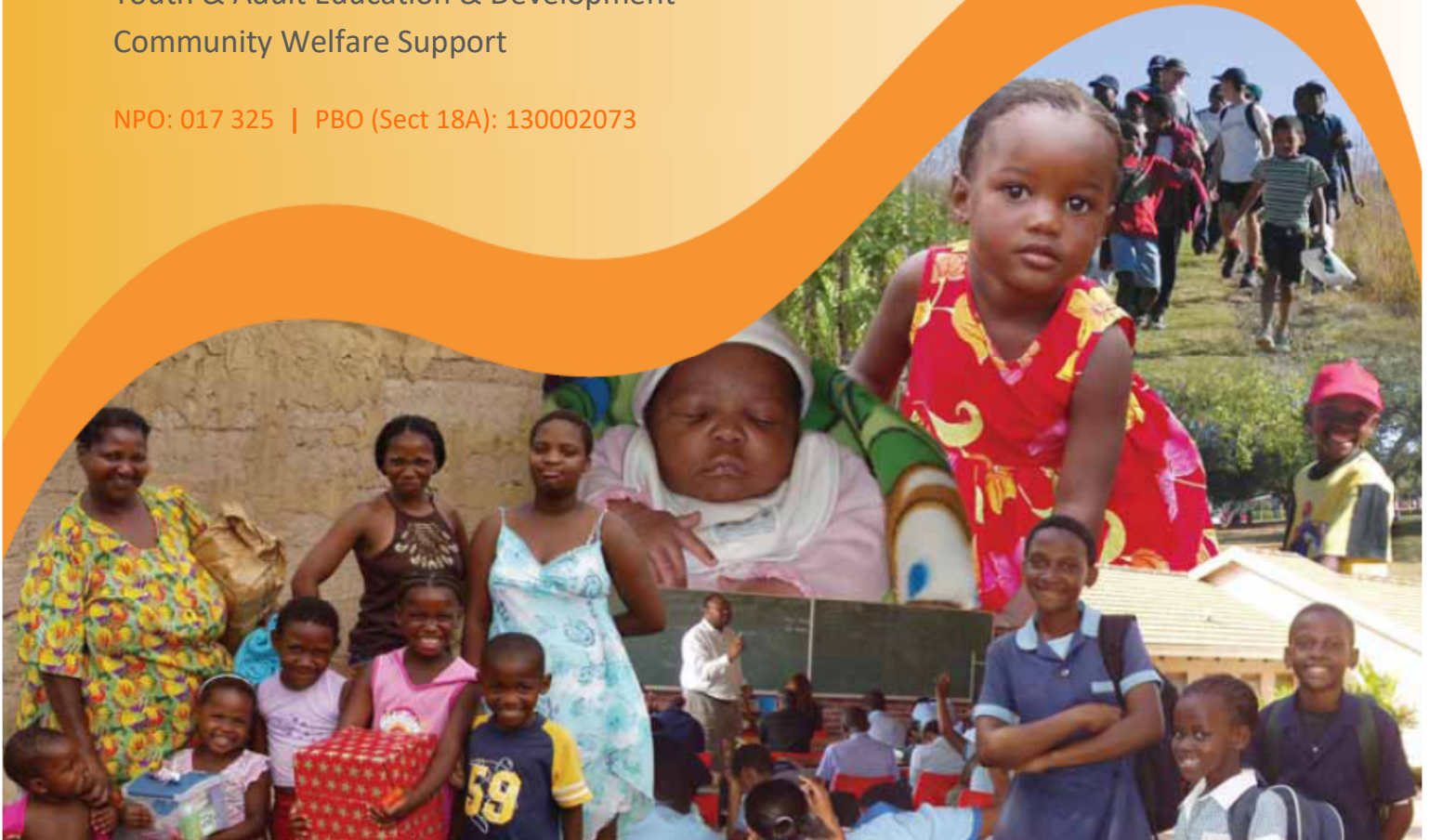

Vision & Mission

The support and development of orphans and vulnerable children (OVCs), youth and vulnerable families particularly in Chesterville, through the following services...

- A Children's Foster Home (est. 2001) providing holistic short and long-term residential care to orphans and vulnerable children. Seventy-seven children have been cared for to date.
- Support and development of a preschool ('The Vukukhanye Educare Centre', est. 2012) to provide quality preschool education and care to approximately 50 children from Chesterville.
- A Bursary Project (est. 2008) offering long-term renewable school and tertiary bursaries to children from Chesterville schools (there are 13 bursars at present, 9 have graduated).
- Health and Welfare support services in Chesterville including the identification and support of vulnerable children and families through home-visits, counselling, assistance with school needs, infant formula, food and household consumables; and other supportive services to Chesterville community members in partnership with local NGOs and community-based organisations.
- Material & other support to Chesterville preschools, schools and community-based organisations.

1.2 Registration Status

Vukukhanye is a Non-Profit Organisation (017-325 NPO) registered with the Department of Social Development and a Public Benefit Organisation (130002073) registered with SARS in terms of Section 18A of the Income Tax Act.

Vukukhanye is an "Exempt Micro Enterprise" as defined in the Amended General Codes: Gazette No. 36928 (Specialised) of the Broad-Based BEE Act. Vukukhanye's latest EME Affidavit can be downloaded from <https://vukukhanye.org/site/eme>. All donations to Vukukhanye are subject to income tax exemption in terms of Section 18A of the Income Tax Act (RSA), and donations (up to 1% of net profit after tax) qualify as Socio-Economic Development contributions.

1.3 Accounting & Auditing

Financial records are submitted quarterly to Vukukhanye's accounting officer (Strategic Business Support), who prepare Annual Financial Statements, as well as generating the Section 18A donation receipts which Vukukhanye provides to donors.

Vukukhanye is audited annually by Baker Tilly Morrison Murray (Chartered Accountants). Vukukhanye's audited Annual Financial Statements for the year-ended 28 February 2019 are included after page 17, can be downloaded from www.vukukhanye.org/site/annualreports and are available on request.

All staff members are registered with SARS for UIF and PAYE (where appropriate) and COID. The payroll and Income Tax Returns are managed by Baker Tilly Morrison Murray. Vukukhanye is compliant with the Department of Labour's "Compensation for Occupational Injuries and Diseases Act 130 of 1993" (Certificate Number 2016058996).

1.6 Volunteers & Community Partners

Vukukhanye's ability to play a role in community-based support in Chesterville and Cato Manor depends on our cooperation with local partners such as 'The Chesterville Residents' Association', The Chesterville Health Clinic, Ikhamva Youth, Ngilonde (feeding scheme), Muthande Society for the Aged, Chesterville Association for the Physically Disabled, Child Welfare Durban and District, Save the Children, Hope Worldwide, primary schools (uKukhanya Kwelanga Junior Primary, Nsimbini Primary, HP Ngwenya Primary), Secondary Schools (Chesterville and Umkhumbane Secondary Schools), a number of crèches and churches.

Volunteers are critical to the operation of all projects and assist with tasks such as transport, collection of donations, medical supervision and care, homework and school support, repairs and maintenance, counselling, entertainment, child-minding, corporate or church 'work-parties', housework help, outings for the children and the provision of resources.

Suncoast staff, The Chesterville Residents' Association and Child Welfare Durban and District; partnered with Vukukhanye in assisting with the distribution of food to 3 foster homes and 20 vulnerable families in Cato Manor (November 2018).



2. PROJECTS

2.1 Children's Foster Home

Overview

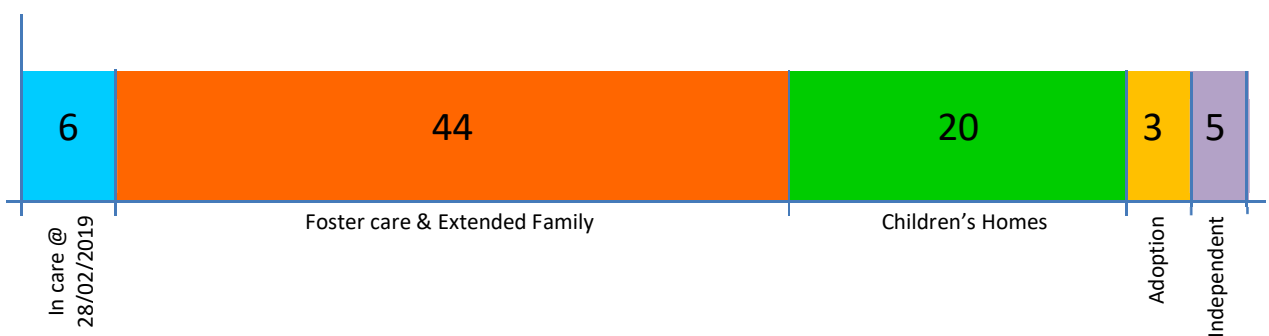
This Home in Berea West, Westville, was established in 2001 to provide a source of short or long-term care for orphans and vulnerable children. Our aim is to provide the children with a loving, stable home environment where they feel secure; and to guide their emotional and educational development as needed. Contact with extended family is supported and when possible, children are reintegrated with their family or placed with adoptive or foster parents; however in some cases long-term placement of children at the Home occurs. The children are cared for by a Foster-mother, Tryphina, who receives assistance with domestic work and respite care from Maureen. The children are assisted with homework by volunteers four days each week.



Children cared for 2001-2019

This Home has provided short and long-term care to 78 children since 2001, with six children aged 12-19 living at the Home at the end of February 2019. After living at the Home for a year, Joel was transitioned by the Department of Social Development to the long-term foster care of his uncle. A teenage girl was placed in crisis care for a weekend by the SAPS Chatsworth Victim-Friendly Centre.

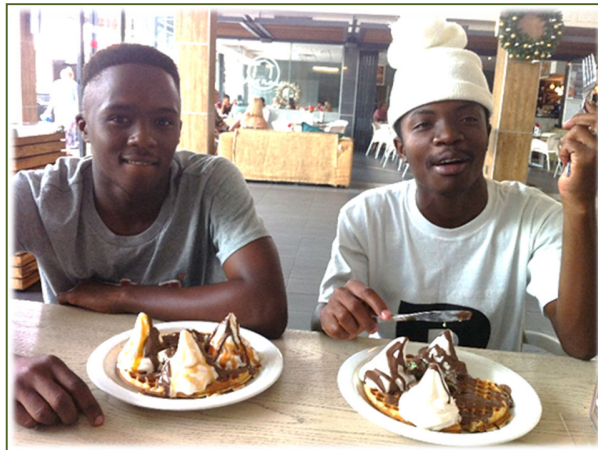
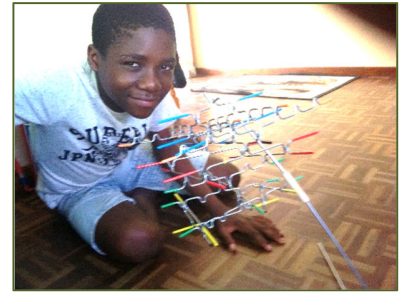
Destination of children 2001-2019 (78)

2.2. Early Childhood Development



2.2.1 The Vukukhanye Educare Centre

This educare centre has been operating in Chesterville for the last 7 years. The school maintains an enrolment of approximately 42 children, divided into 3 age-groups (Red: 1-2 years, Yellow: 2-3 years, Green: 4-5 years). The children enjoy a full-day of in and out-door activities as well as breakfast, a mid-morning snack and lunch daily. The hours of operation are 7:30am to 3:00pm daily, with the formal programme between 8:00am and 1:00pm.

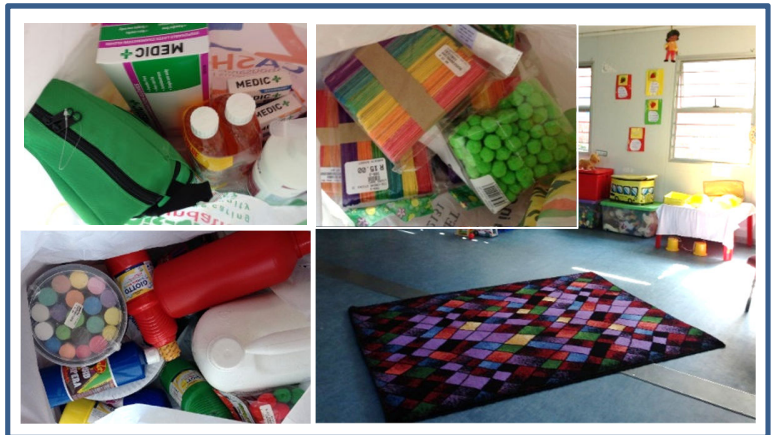
The three dedicated teachers are all continuing with accredited ECD training at NELRU and Caversham. Winnie Maphumulo recently completed her Level 5 Early Childhood Development qualification. This is a great achievement after a number of years of consistent progress. The educare centre also benefits from participating in the Cato Manor Preschool Forum, which provides training and support from a central resource centre at Inkanyezi Crèche.

DE-WORMING

With consent from parents, 31 children were provided with de-worming medication, with funds from the Starfish Foundation. These were children at the Vukukhanye Educare Centre who hadn't received de-worming medication from the Government clinics or privately during the last 6-12 months.

Evidence/Motivation...

"Worms are unfortunately a very common and normal issue for children and adults alike. It is our responsibility to ensure that our children are free of this parasite. Worms are everywhere and contaminate public areas such as schools and playgrounds. They affect more than a billion people worldwide. From the age of two years old, children and adults should be dewormed once every 6 months. Good health increases school attendance and increased educational enrichment. Children that suffer from chronic worm infestations suffer as they miss school on days when they feel ill. By deworming your children, you effectively reduce the overall spread of worm infestations in the community. Treated and untreated children benefit from this, by improving the health and participation of school-going children. As a result, treating school age children can reduce the total burden of disease due to intestinal worm infections by 70% in the community as a whole. In informal regions especially, worm infestations have been the lead reason that young children are admitted to hospitals due to abdominal emergencies in South Africa." 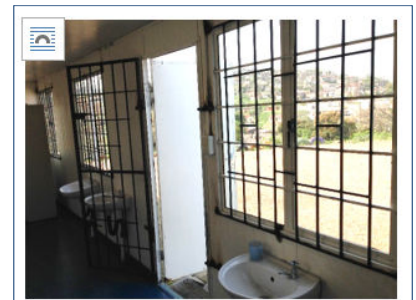


World Oceans' Week (October 2018)

Vukukhanye has continued to facilitate support where possible for preschools and Grade R units in the Chesterville area...

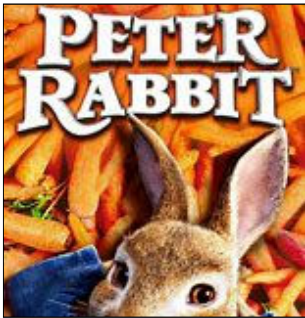
School stationery for Grade R

2.3 Bursary Project

2.3.1 Background, Bursars & Graduates

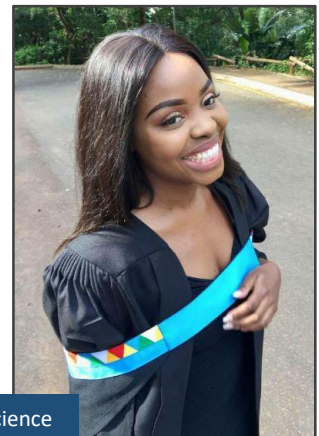
Building on our long-standing relationship with Chesterville Secondary School, Vukukhanye launched a Tertiary Education Bursary Project at this school in 2008 - all Grade 12 learners were invited to apply, two candidates were selected and their tertiary studies sponsored from 2009. A long-term partnership with Suncoast from 2009 made expansion and the ongoing operation of the bursary project possible, to the extent that we have to date supported 22 bursars, nine of whom have graduated. Bursaries include fees, text books, stationery and uniforms and are long-term; our goal being to work with the bursar and their family until they achieve the tertiary qualification of their choice. Guidance, mentorship and support is provided to help make wise choices and support the bursar through challenges along the way. Vukukhanye has to date helped nine bursars achieve tertiary qualifications - in the fields of economics, accounting, civil engineering, marketing, nursing, as well as welding & fabrication. Each bursar has a unique story and we have included some of Silindile's journey below...

2.3.2 Silindile's Journey

Sli was raised by her grandmother, who sadly passed away when Sli was in grade 10; after which Sli continued living with her grandfather and uncles in very poor conditions in a small home in Chesterville. Sli performed well at school and was selected from the Grade 8 class of Chesterville Secondary School in 2009 as a beneficiary of Vukukhanye's Bursary Programme. Sli has been supported in her educational journey for the nine years since; including with tuition fees, text books and stationery; as well as assistance with food and transport costs to travel to and from university. Silindile passed all her school grades and went on to be accepted to study a Bachelor of Social Science Degree at the University of KwaZulu-Natal.

Sli specialised in Geography and Environmental Management and in 2017 achieved her Bachelor's Degree. Sli developed a passion for teaching and in 2018 started her Post Graduate Certificate in Education (PGCE) at the University of KwaZulu-Natal Edgewood Campus, conducted her practical teacher training at Chesterville Secondary School and is now qualified to teach in a secondary school. We are very proud of Sli's achievement!

"In 2009 I was diagnosed with pneumonia and tuberculosis, however my illness did not hinder my way to success because I had Vukukhanye as my support system and I already knew from a very young age that I wanted to succeed in life and the only thing that would help me is education" (Silindile).

2.4 Community welfare & support of vulnerable children

The aim of the Welfare Support Project is to contribute to social welfare service delivery in the greater Chesterville area of Cato Manor, by identifying and supporting vulnerable children and vulnerable families. Vukukhanye's community worker, Makhosi Khamanga, conducts home visits and follows up on needs referred by community members. Makhosi assists with a weekly support group for HIV positive mothers and has gradually built on her skills through ongoing training in counselling, home-based care and assisting children's adherence to ARV therapy. As from 2016 the responsibilities of the supervisor and three teachers at the Vukukhanye Educare Centre were expanded to include identifying and supporting vulnerable children within Chesterville, as well as conducting TB screening on the children attending the Vukukhanye Educare Centre.

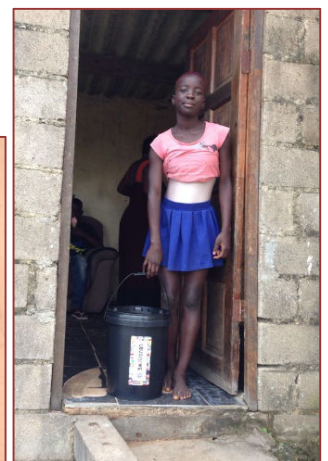
Support of orphans and vulnerable children in Chesterville

Partnership with The Starfish Greathearts Foundation enabled Vukukhanye to continue with the OVC Programme in 2018/19, specifically targeting children 0-18 years old. This programme includes children living in Chesterville as well as those enrolled at the Vukukhanye Educare Centre (where children also receive breakfast and lunch daily). Approximately 150 children are assisted on a monthly basis. Support services include counselling, emergency or monthly assistance with food, infant formula, toiletries (including sanitary pads) & household consumables, school needs and follow-up on cases of abuse and poverty, accessing official documentation and grants, as well as referrals to other organisations.

- In addition to our bursars, Vukukhanye was able to help 20 vulnerable children with uniforms, stationery and school fees towards their 2019 needs, thanks to funding from Starfish.
- Suncoast donated six wheelchairs, which were donated to the Muthande Society for the Aged. This organisation operates 8 service centres in eThekweni, including one in Chesterville.
- HIV Adherence in Children: Two of Vukukhanye's careworkers, who have received training in supporting adherence to ARV treatment in children, participated in a pilot programme run by Zoë-Life. The process is based on use of a child-friendly application on tablets/cell-phones.
- Vukukhanye supported by 3C Church participated in a city-wide initiative ("City Story") in December, where churches collaborated under the banner "City Serve". Vukukhanye and 3C Church distributed 20 food hampers to families in Chesterville.

Female Sexual Reproductive Health

1) Re-usable sanitary pad workshop and kits for 25 girls

Funding from the Starfish Foundation enabled Vukukhanye to purchase 25 packs of re-usable sanitary pads for girls from Chesterville. Each girl received a pack containing 3 pairs of panties, 5 washable sanitary pads and 1 pad for night. The girls attended an educational workshop when they received their pads in September, where a trainer from SUBZ (<http://www.subz pads.co.za/>) provided education on the menstrual cycle and how to properly use the pads.



2) Chesterville Secondary school female learners

In August 2018, Vukukhanye partnered with Suncoast and Chesterville Secondary School in a reproductive and menstrual health education drive in honour of *Women's Month*. Suncoast's nurse educated all 430 female learners at the school on the importance of female sanitary hygiene and the correct use of sanitary products. This was very well received by the young ladies at the school, who were also all given sanitary pads.



Suncoast Monthly Staff Support Visits

Suncoast staff continued to support community projects in Chesterville through their monthly CUP ("Community Upliftment Project") visits. This included re-visiting projects to build on relationships established during previous years, as well as new projects. Suncoast staff consistently arrived in numbers, often accompanied and supported by the Suncoast maintenance or landscaping team. These visits have been a tremendous benefit to those concerned and are a great encouragement to the community. In addition to those already mentioned, support provided in 2018/19 is listed below...

‘Africa Day’ dance workshop at Chesterville Secondary School (May 2018)

To celebrate *Africa-Day*, more than 180 learners at Chesterville Secondary School were taught the *Kuduro* and other traditional African dances.



‘Youth Day’ Careers Expo (June 2018)

In honour of *Youth Day*, a careers Expo was held at a West City Fellowship in Chesterville; to which Grade 11 and 12 learners were invited, as well as recent school leavers. Suncoast arranged for eight tertiary educational institutions to be present to provide study guidance and information.



‘Mandela Day’ Soup Kitchen (July 2018)

Meals from the soup kitchen benefitted 300 people & 67 Care-Kits were handed out to those most in need.

Food Drive - food was provided to the three 3 foster homes in Cato Manor operated by *Child Welfare Durban and District*, as well as 20 vulnerable families identified by the Chesterville Residents Association (November 2018)



3. FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

3.1 Treasurer's Report – February 2019

Vukukhanye's purpose continues to be fulfilled which is to provide care for orphans and vulnerable children. The commitment of faithful and loyal supporters of Vukukhanye continues to encourage us in the work that we are blessed to do; which without you Vukukhanye would not exist. Thank you to our donors for your continued support. Our involvement continues in the following areas:

- The Foster Home at 7 Bristol Road
- The Early Childhood Development centre
- Welfare Support
- Education Bursaries

For the year under review total Donor income increased over the previous year by some R 1 326 144 (99.6%). The increase is mainly due to the donation received from Anthony van der Meulen and Willa Fourie of the Foster Home property (7 Bristol Road, Berea West) which is valued at R1 130 000; this is a non-cash donation. Expenses increased by R 326 760 (24.4%). The increase was mainly due to the transfer of the house donation into the name of Vukukhanye. The costs are twofold; firstly settling of the bond which amounted to R 127 879 and then the related professional fees which amounted to R 55 538. These costs were largely covered by a donation from St James Charity based in the UK, which amounted to R140 000. This year we recorded a surplus of R 991 339 (2018: deficit R 8 569), which is attributable to the donation of the house. However, in real terms we incurred a trading loss of R 140 760.

We appreciate the management of Vukukhanye for their continued efforts to source new donors and their attempt to curb the pressure on overheads.


The following expense items were the larger movements both in increases and decreases;

- Employee Costs: Increase of R 59 356 (8.4%)
 - *Normal salary increments for the year.*
- Equipment expenses: Increase of R 18 858
 - *Mostly purchase of equipment for the educare centre, such as mattresses, new cupboards, carpets, bikes and other classroom equipment.*
- Lease rentals: Increase of R 127 268 (279.1%)
 - *This increase is as a result of a donation to have the bond on 7 Bristol Road paid up so that it could be transferred into Vukukhanye's Name.*
- Professional Fees: Increase of R 55 538 (497.5%)
 - *Transfer costs related to the transfer of the house into Vukukhanye's name.*
- Repairs and Maintenance: Increase of R 19 705 (33.3%)
 - Car steering rack repair; car service; house alarm repair; window repair, preschool plumbing and security gates/burglar bars.
- Tertiary Education: Increase of R 86 233 (112.0%)
 - Two more bursars started tertiary studies during the year under review and one bursar's fees were paid in full at the beginning of 2019.

The focus for 2020 financial year will continue to be on our core items above and ensure they function with excellence, as they currently do. Further we will continue to look for new donors and supporters to ensure the sustainability of Vukukhanye into the future.

We again thank our faithful donors and supporters, whose continued donation of finances and time is greatly appreciated and we look forward to your support going forward. Again, we would request that in your sphere of influence, you would share the work of Vukukhanye to assist us with our fund-raising efforts, which will grow our work of uplifting the lives of people in need.
