## Vision & Mission

The support and development of orphans and vulnerable children (OVCs), youth and vulnerable families particularly in Chesterville, through the following services...

- A Children's Foster Home (est. 2001) providing holistic short and long-term residential care to orphans and vulnerable children. Seventy-five children have been cared for to date.
- Development of a preschool ('The Vukukhanye Educare Centre', est. 2012) to provide quality preschool education and care to approximately 55 children from Chesterville.
- A Bursary Project (est. 2008) offering long-term renewable school and tertiary bursaries to children from Chesterville schools (there are 18 bursars at present, 6 have graduated).
- Health and Welfare support services in Chesterville including the identification and support of vulnerable children and families through home-visits, counselling, assistance with school needs, infant formula, food and household consumables; and other supportive services to Chesterville community members in partnership with local NGOs and community-based organisations.
- Material & other support to Chesterville preschools, schools and community-based organisations.

## 1.6 Volunteers

The ongoing effectiveness of Vukukhanye is largely thanks to support from various individuals, churches, organisations and companies. Volunteers are critical to the operation of all projects and assist with tasks such as transport, collection of donations, medical supervision and care, homework and school support, repairs and maintenance, counselling, entertainment, child-minding, corporate or church 'work-parties', housework help, outings for the children and the provision of resources.

We have been fortunate to partner with Zoë-Life for the past 3 years, who facilitate the placement of volunteers as part of the UK Government International Citizenship Service (ICS) Programme; where UK and local youth work together in South African communities. In 2017/18 we had two teams placed for 12 weeks each; working at the Vukukhanye Educare Centre in Chesterville. Another source of regular teams of volunteers is the UKZN medical school. Volunteers from other tertiary institutions and local schools also assist when they are required to perform 'community service' as part of their annual coursework.

## 2. PROJECTS

### 2.1 Children's Foster Home

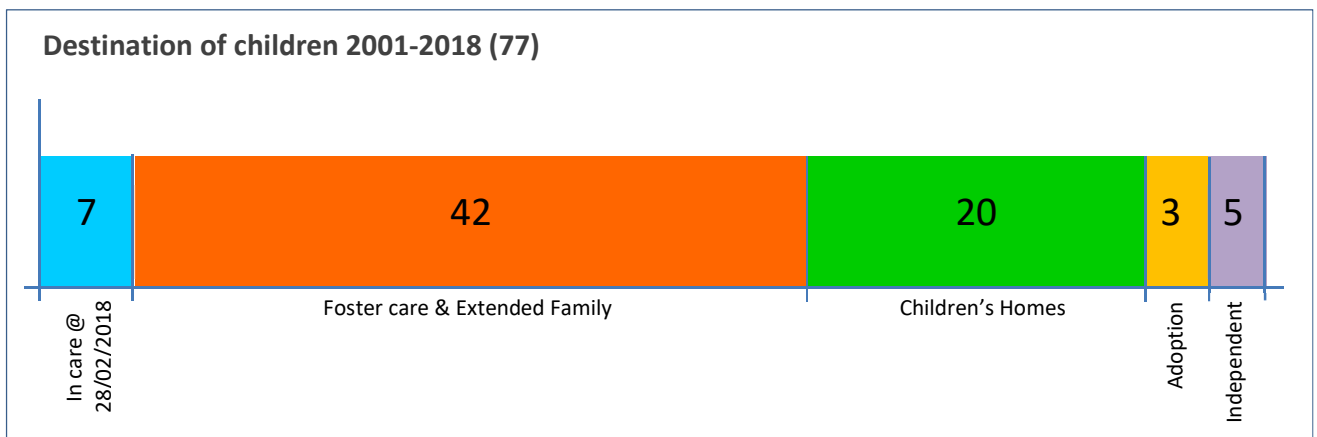


#### Background

This Home in Berea West, Westville, was established in 2001 to provide a source of short or long-term care for orphans and vulnerable children. Our aim is to provide the children with a loving, stable home environment, guide their educational progress and provide psychosocial and other support (e.g. counselling and extra-lessons) as needed. Contact with extended family is supported when appropriate and wherever possible children are reintegrated with their family or placed with adoptive or foster parents; but in some cases long-term placement of children at the Home occurs. The children are cared for by a Foster-mother, Tryphina, who receives assistance with domestic work and respite care from Maureen.

#### Children cared for 2001-2018

This Home has provided short and long-term care to 77 children since 2001, with seven children aged 12-18 living at the Home at the end of February 2018.

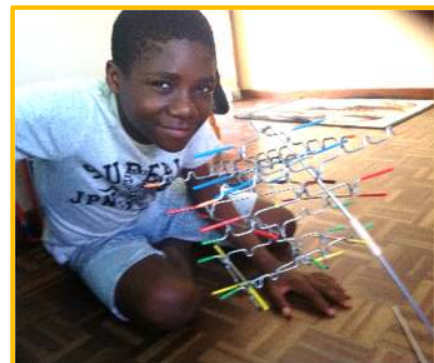

## 2.2. Early Childhood Development



### 2.2.1 The Vukukhanye Educare Centre

The Vukukhanye Educare Centre was established in Chesterville in March 2012 and we are very pleased with the consistent quality of care and education which has been provided by the dedicated staff for the last six years. An average of 46 children attended daily during 2017 and the enrollment increased to 53 in February 2018. The children are cared for by five staff (1 supervisor, 3 teachers and 1 cook/cleaner). The hours of operation are 7:30am to 3:00pm daily, with the formal programme between 8:00am and 1:00pm.



Twenty-one children 'graduated' at the end of 2017, ready for Grade R in 2018. A special year-end graduation party was held, which was attended by parents and family.

The children are placed in three age-groups (Red: 1-2 years, Yellow: 2-3 years, Green: 4-5 years). In December we were able to purchase a large quantity of educational resources (mainly puzzles and educational toys) to cater for the unique needs of these 3 age-groups. We have also been able to add to the school library on ongoing basis. In addition to the early childhood development services provided; the children are fed breakfast, lunch and a morning snack daily. Partnership with the local Department of Health ensures that standard immunizations are done on-site during visits from clinic staff.

Ongoing training of the staff is a priority, and all staff have received unaccredited training in the care of children 0-3 and 3-6 years old through Phakamisa, and are currently enrolled in accredited (NQF Levels 4-5) early childhood development training through NELRU and Caversham. The educare centre also benefits from participating in the Cato Manor Preschool Forum, which provides training and support a central resource centre at Inkanyezi Crèche.

## 2.2.2 Chesterville Preschool Support

Vukukhanye has continued to facilitate support where possible for eight preschools in the Chesterville area. The schools are Bamba Izandla, Sicheluthando Educare Centre, Ekuthuleni Educare Centre, Mazenod, Zamokuhle, Khulakahle, Inami and Shekinah Crèches. This is made possible by support from Cygnet Preparatory School, Saturn Pre-Primary, The Rotary Club of Westville, Australian Books for Children of Africa (ABCA), local companies, and in 2017 from Blackhall Pre-Primary in Edinburgh.

Vukukhanye’s partnership with Suncoast includes monthly staff CUP (“Community Upliftment Project”) visits, which often include visits to and support of Chesterville preschools. During 2017/18, this included...

## 2.3 Bursary Project

### Background & Graduates

Building on our long-standing relationship with Chesterville Secondary School, Vukukhanye launched a Tertiary Education Bursary Project at this school on the 22<sup>nd</sup> of August 2008- all Grade 12 learners were invited to apply, two candidates were selected and their tertiary studies sponsored from 2009. A long-term partnership with Suncoast from 2009 made expansion and the ongoing operation of the bursary project possible, to the extent that we have to date supported 24 bursars, seven of whom have qualified (the list of graduates is below).

### Current bursars

Unfortunately two bursars dropped out in 2017, bringing the number of bursars being supported in 2018 to 15; seven of whom are at school and eight at tertiary institutions. We are very pleased with the progress of these bursars. The fields of study being pursued by the tertiary students includes commerce, accounting and business management, Public Management, Chemical Engineering, Human Resources Management, Fabrication (welding and boiler-making) and teaching. ***Slindile's Story*** - each bursar has their own unique story. Slindile for example was selected from the Grade 8 class of Chesterville Secondary School in 2009 and has been supported in her educational journey for the nine years since. Slindile passed all her school grades and then in 2017 achieved her Bachelor's Degree in Social Science (majoring in Geography) from the University of KwaZulu-Natal. In 2018 she started her PGCE (Post-graduate Certificate in Education) at Edgewood and by the end of 2018 will be qualified to teach in a secondary school. We are very proud of her achievement!

## 2.4 Community welfare & support of vulnerable children

The aim of the Welfare Support Project is to contribute to social welfare service delivery in the greater Chesterville area of Cato Manor, by identifying and supporting vulnerable children and vulnerable families. Vukukhanye's community worker, Makhosi Khamanga, conducts home visits and follows up on needs referred by community members. Support provided includes counselling, emergency or monthly assistance with food, infant formula, toiletries (including sanitary pads) & household consumables, follow-up on cases of abuse and poverty, accessing official documentation and grants, as well as referrals to other organisations. Makhosi assists with a weekly support group for HIV positive mothers and has gradually built on her skills through ongoing training in counselling, home-based care and assisting children's adherence to ARV therapy. As from 2016 the responsibilities of the supervisor and three teachers at the Vukukhanye Educare Centre were expanded to include identifying and supporting vulnerable children within Chesterville, as well as conducting TB screening on the children attending the Vukukhanye Educare Centre.

### Educational Support (School fees, uniforms & stationery)

In early 2018 we were able to provide school fees, uniforms and stationery to 19 vulnerable children identified by careworkers. In addition, 20 scientific calculators were purchased for children studying mathematics and/or Science in Grades 11 and 12 at Chesterville Secondary School, and 55 pairs of new school shoes were provided to learners at Nsimbini Primary School, identified by the school as being most in need.

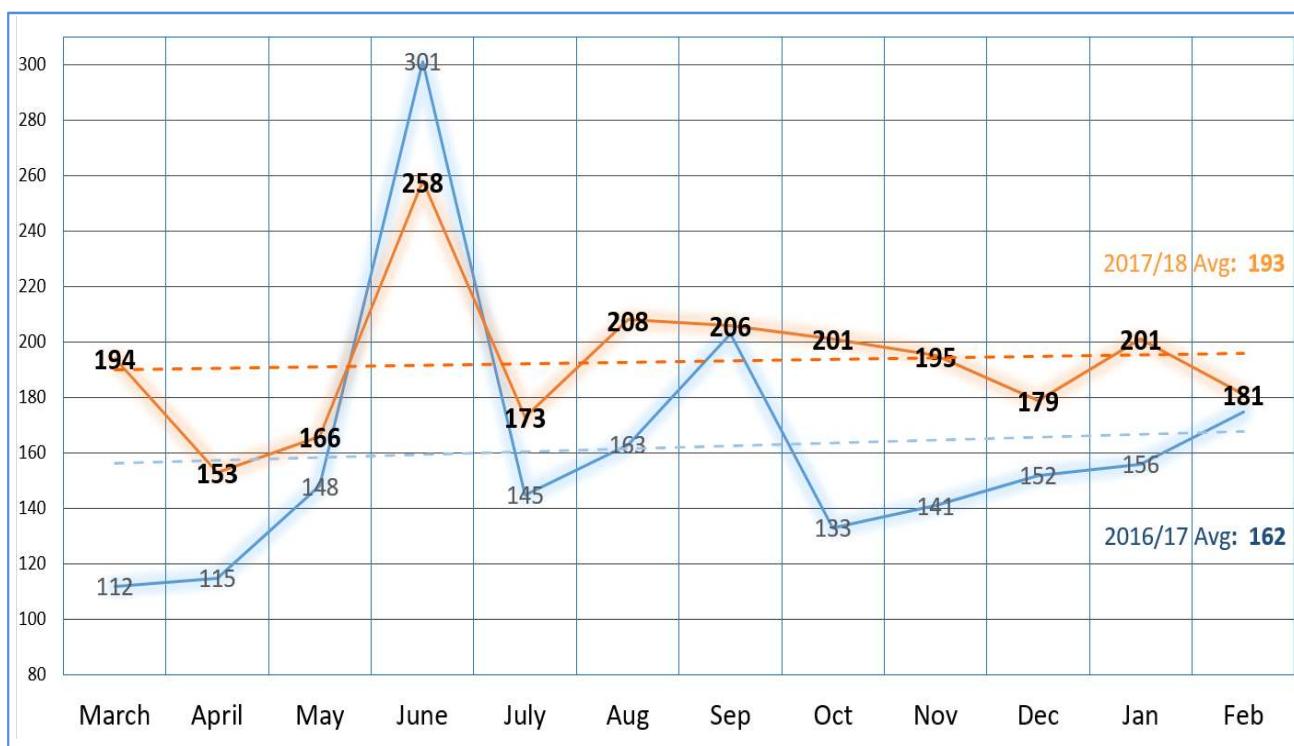
### CITY SERVE

As a follow-up to the 'Durban Story' event, Vukukhanye supported by 3-C Church participated in a city-wide initiative in December, where churches collaborated under the banner "City Serve". Vukukhanye and 3-C Church distributed 20 food hampers to families in Chesterville.



## Support of orphans and vulnerable children (OVCs) in Chesterville

Partnership with The Starfish Greathearts Foundation enabled Vukukhanye to continue with the OVC Programme in 2017/18, specifically targeting children 0-18 years old. This programme includes children living in Chesterville as well as those enrolled at the Vukukhanye Educare Centre (where children also receive breakfast and lunch daily). **The graph below reflects the total number of children who received at least one support service in the months March 2017 to February 2018, compared to the same period in 2016/17.** (Services include daily meals, food parcels, home visits, material support, school needs, sanitary pads & TB screening)



An average of 193 children were assisted on a monthly basis in 2017/18, compared to 162 per month in 2016/17.

## 3. FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

### 3.1 Treasurer's Report – February 2018

We are grateful that another year has passed and the work of Vukukhanye continues. Vukukhanye's purpose continues to be fulfilled which is to provide care to orphans and vulnerable children. The commitment of faithful and loyal supporters of Vukukhanye continues to encourage us in the work that we are blessed to do; which without you Vukukhanye would not exist. Thank you for your continued support.

Our involvement continues in the following areas:

- The Children's Foster Home at 7 Bristol Road, Westville
- The Vukukhanye Educare Centre in Chesterville
- Welfare Support
- Education Bursaries

For the year under review total Donor income increased over the previous year by some R 164 250 (14.1%), this is very encouraging as the difficult economic times continue. Expenses increased by R 217 275 (19.3%) which is disappointing but understandable with the ever-increasing cost of living. This resulted in a deficit of R 8 570 (2017: Surplus R 44 343). We appreciate the management of Vukukhanye for their continued efforts to source new donors and their attempt to curb the pressure on overheads.


The following expense items were the larger movements both in increases and decreases;

- Employee Costs: Increase of R 131 539 (22.9%)
  - *The major reason for the increase is a restatement of an error in the 2017 AFS. The medical Aid component of the CEO's salary was disclosed as medical expenses in 2017 as opposed to being included in Salaries. There were staff salary increases (CPI+1%) and a groundsman (1 day per week) was employed at the educare centre.*
- Computer expenses: Increase of R 7 676
  - *A new server, laptop and software were purchased as computers were not functioning properly.*
- Groceries: Increase of R 78 357 (116.4%)
  - *This spend is in line with the budget received from Starfish. Starfish provide Vukukhanye with a budget each month which is to be spent on food parcels, preschool food and sanitary pads. In addition, several workshops were conducted on hygiene, healthy eating, dental hygiene and menstrual health. At each of these workshops each of the attendees received an appropriate hamper of product.*
- Rates: Increase of R 6 082 (172.8%)
  - *General municipal increases for the Foster Home.*
- Repairs and Maintenance: Increase of R 33 591 (131.4%)
  - *General upgrades, maintenance and security needs at the foster home and educare centre. Suncoast sponsored a rebuild of a home that burnt down, to the value of R10 000.*

- School Expenses: Increase of R 31 732 (101.3%)
  - Most of the children at the foster home needed new school uniforms, including three who started at new schools. All grade 11's and 12's attended career counselling at Focus on the Family. We also purchased 20 scientific calculators for the matric class at Chesterville Secondary. Suncoast provided a donation which enabled us to provide 55 pairs of school shoes for children attending Nsimbini Primary School and 60 school bags for the Grade R's. The Starfish Educational Support budget increased from 2017, which enabled us to support more children with school fees, uniforms and stationery, and purchase educational resources for the Vukukhanye Educare Centre.

The focus for 2019 financial year will continue to be on our core items above and ensure they function with excellence, as they currently do. Further we will continue to look for new donors and supporters to ensure the sustainability of Vukukhanye into the future.

We again thank our faithful donors and supporters, whose continued donation of finances and time is greatly appreciated and we look forward to your support going forward. Again, we would request that in your sphere of influence, you would share the work of Vukukhanye to assist us with our fund raising efforts, which will grow our work of uplifting the lives of disadvantaged people.
