



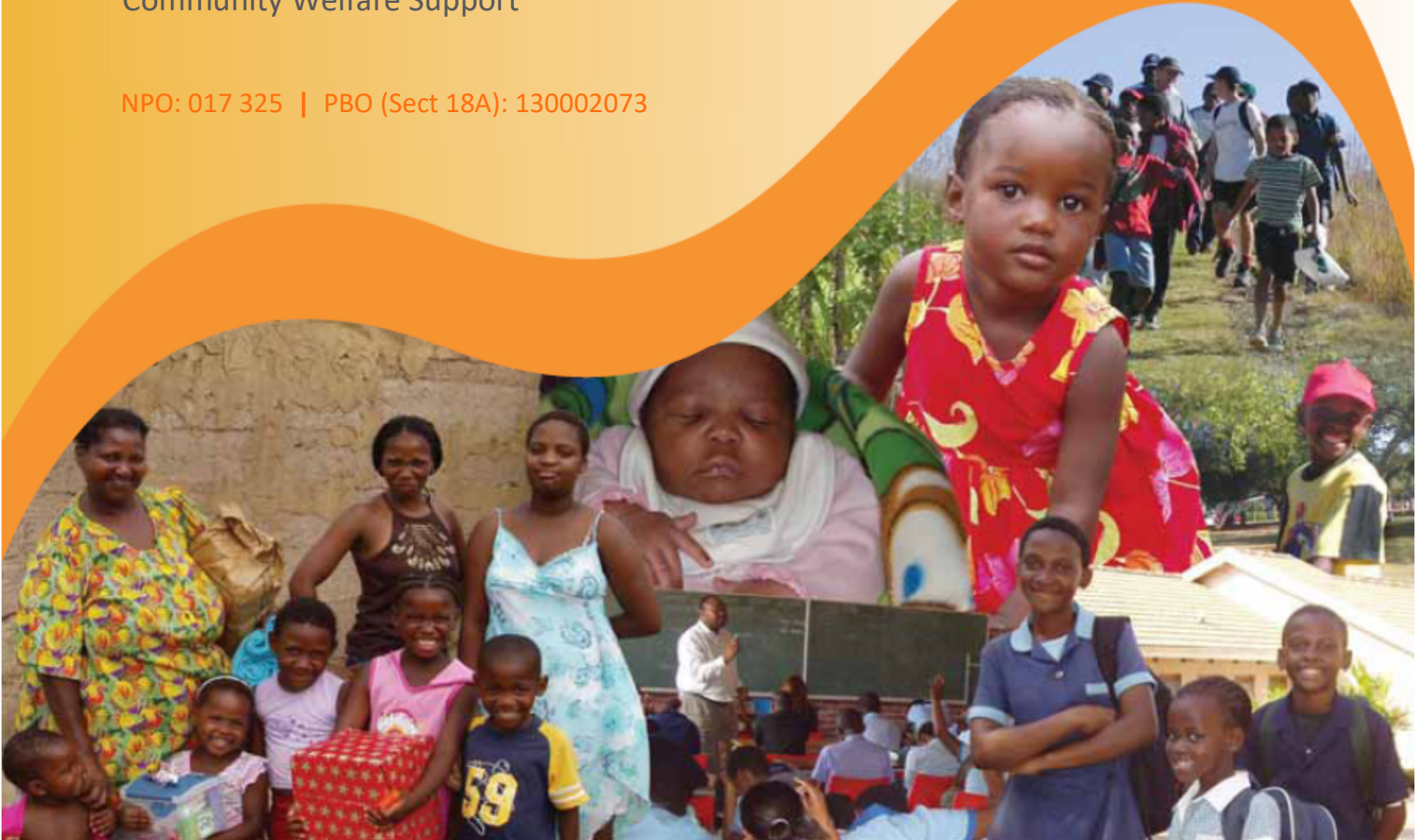

Vision

Through community partnership and leadership development to play a meaningful role in the holistic development of the community of Chesterville.

Mission

The support and development of orphans and vulnerable children (OVCs) and vulnerable families, particularly in Chesterville, through the following services...

- A Children's Foster Home (est. 2001) providing holistic short and long-term residential care to orphans and vulnerable children. Seventy three children have been cared for to date.
- Development of a preschool ('The Vukukhanye Educare Centre', est. 2012) to provide quality preschool education and care to approximately 60 children from Chesterville.
- A Bursary Project (est. 2008) offering long-term renewable school and tertiary bursaries to children from Chesterville schools (there 18 bursars at present, 6 have graduated)
- Health and Welfare support services in Chesterville including the identification and support of vulnerable children and families through home-visits, counselling, assistance with school needs, infant formula, food and household consumables; and other supportive services to Chesterville community members in partnership with local NGOs and community-based organisations.
- Material & other support to Chesterville preschools, schools and community-based organisations.

Registration Status

Vukukhanye is registered with the Department of Social Development as a Non-Profit Organisation (017-325 NPO), and with the South African Revenue Service (SARS) as a Section 18A Public Benefit Organisation (PBO number: 130002073). Income Tax Number: 9809641146.

Vukukhanye meets the requirements of Code Series 500 of the BEE Codes of Good Practice (SED Certificate Number: BS SED 020817-1).

1.2 Registration Status

Vukukhanye is a Non-Profit Organisation (017-325 NPO) registered with the Department of Social Development and a Public Benefit Organisation (130002073) registered with SARS in terms of Section 18A of the Income Tax Act.

Vukukhanye has been approved by a BEE verification agency (Beescore) as a "Socio-Economic Development Beneficiary" (Certificate number *BS SED 020817-1*) and meets the requirements of Code Series 500 of the BEE Codes of Good Practice. All donations to Vukukhanye are subject to income tax exemption in terms of Section 18A of the Income Tax Act (RSA), and donations (up to 1% of net profit after tax) qualify as Socio-Economic Development contributions.

1.6 Volunteers

The ongoing operation of Vukukhanye is largely thanks to support from various individuals, churches, organisations and companies. Volunteers are critical to the operation of all projects and assist with tasks such as transport, collection of donations, medical supervision and care, homework and school support, repairs and maintenance, counselling, entertainment, child-minding, corporate or church 'work-parties', housework help, outings for the children and the provision of resources.

We have been fortunate to partner with Zoë-Life for the past 3 years, who facilitate the placement of volunteers as part of the UK Government International Citizenship Service (ICS) Programme; where UK and local youth work together in South African communities. In 2016/17 we had two teams placed for 12 weeks each; working at the Vukukhanye Educare Centre in Chesterville. Another source of regular teams of volunteers is the UKZN medical school. Volunteers from other tertiary institutions, and local schools, also assist when they are required to perform 'community service' as part of their annual coursework.

2. PROJECTS

2.1 Children's Foster Home



Background

This Home, in Berea West, Westville, was established in 2001 to provide a source of short or long-term care for orphans and vulnerable children. Our aim is to provide the children with a loving, stable home environment and associated support (education, nutrition, legal, financial, psychological and healthcare) and to help the children grow up to be healthy, educated, socially well-adjusted adults. Whenever possible children are reintegrated with their family or placed with adoptive or foster parents. Where this is not possible, long-term placement of children at the Home occurs. The children are cared for by a Foster-mother, Tryphina, who receives assistance with domestic work and respite care from Maureen.

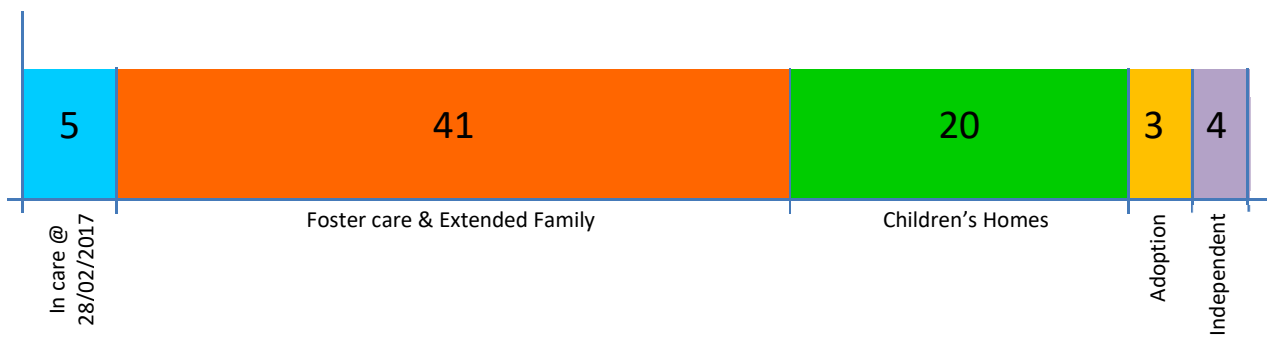
Children cared for 2001-2017

This Home has provided short and long-term care to 73 children since 2001, with five children aged 11-17 being cared for as at the end of February 2017. As always education is a priority, especially with Tracy in grade 11 and Dean, Mloni & Yaya in Grade 8 (progressing to Grade 9 in 2017). Thank very much to everyone who has assisted with home-work support, mentoring and outings during the year. Another priority was equipping the children with skills to safely navigate social media and the internet (see *Tech Savvy Parenting, Futureproof your Child, The Digital Invasion and Internet Dangers.org*).

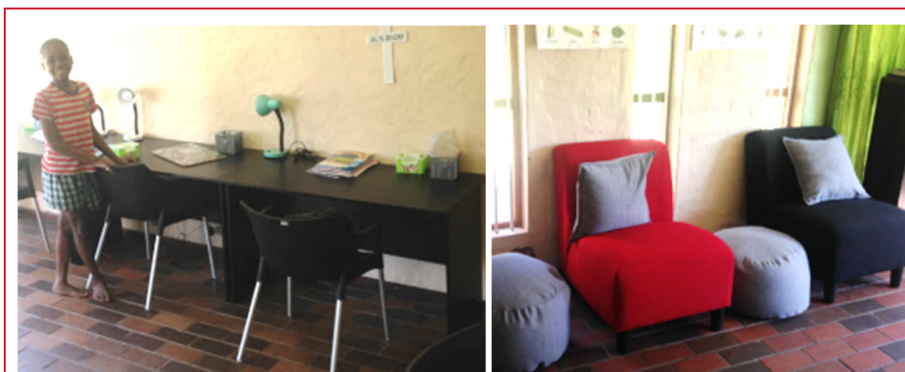

2.2. Early Childhood Development

2.2.1 The Vukukhanye Educare Centre



Vukukhanye established an educare centre in Chesterville in March 2012. The school operates from two new prefabricated classrooms and five 2nd hand park homes. Approximately sixty children are enrolled, cared for by 5 staff (1 supervisor, 3 teachers and 1 cook/cleaner). The hours of operation are 7:30am to 3:00pm daily, with the formal programme between 8:00am and 1:00pm.

The children (aged 18 months to 5 years) are placed in 3 age-groups (Red, Yellow and Green). In addition to the early childhood development services provided, the children are fed breakfast, lunch and a morning snack daily. Partnership with the local Department of Health ensures that standard immunizations are done on site during visits from clinic staff.

Ongoing training of the staff is a priority, and all staff have received unaccredited training in the care of children 0-3 and 3-6 years old through Phakamisa, and are currently enrolled in accredited (NQF Levels 4-5) early childhood development training through NELRU and Caversham. The educare centre also benefits from participating in the Cato Manor Preschool Forum. The staff are extremely committed and dedicated to ongoing training they are receiving. Our two teachers' assistants have been a great asset this year, as have Zoë-Life volunteers as part of the *International Citizenship Programme* (ICS). The ICS Programme is the United Kingdom's global volunteering programme for young people aged 18-25 who want to do voluntary development work abroad, who are placed in teams with local volunteers.

2.2.2 Chesterville Preschool Support

Vukukhanye has continued to facilitate support where possible for seven preschools in the Chesterville area. The schools are Bamba Izandla, Sicheluthando Educare Centre, Ekuthuleni Educare Centre, Mazenod, Zamokuhle, Khulakahle and Inami Crèches.

Vukukhanye’s partnership with Suncoast includes monthly staff CUP (“Community Upliftment Project”) visits, which often include visits to and support of Chesterville preschools. This included treating children from the Zamokuhle Crèche and Ridgeview temporary accommodation settlement to a Christmas Party.

2.3 Bursary Project



Background & Current Bursars

Building on our long-standing relationship with Chesterville Secondary School, Vukukhanye launched a Tertiary Education Bursary Project at this school on the 22nd of August 2008. All Grade 12 learners at Chesterville Secondary School were invited to apply; two candidates were selected and their tertiary studies sponsored from 2009. A long-term partnership with Suncoast from 2009 made expansion and the ongoing operation of the bursary project possible. We have to date supported 24 bursars (*see list and photographs on pages 11 & 12*), ten of whom are presently at school and eight at tertiary institutions. Two learners completed Grade 12 in 2016 and a further three will matriculate at the end of 2017.

All bursaries are renewable and cover school & tuition fees and other education related expenses such as uniforms, stationery and text books. The schools from which bursars have been selected are: Grade 1 bursars from uKukhanya Kwelanga Junior Primary School, Grade 5 bursars from Christopher Nxumalo Senior Primary School and Grade 8 & 12 bursars from Chesterville Secondary School.

The Bursary Programme has produced six graduates; in the fields of nursing, commerce, marketing, biological science and civil engineering.

Text book library

While learners at Chesterville Schools are provided with text books by their school, they are generally not allowed to take them home. Vukukhanye is assisting bursars by buying textbooks, particularly for subjects with which they are struggling. The learners can then use the books at home for homework and self-study. The textbooks are then returned to Vukukhanye at the end of the year and made available to subsequent bursars as needed.

2.4 Community welfare & support of vulnerable children

The aim of the Welfare Support Project is to contribute to social welfare service delivery in the greater Chesterville area of Cato Manor, by identifying and supporting vulnerable children and vulnerable families.

Vukukhanye's community worker, Makhosi Khamanga, conducts home visits and follows up on needs referred by community members. Support provided includes counselling, emergency or monthly assistance with food, infant formula, toiletries (including sanitary pads) & household consumables, follow-up on cases of abuse and poverty, accessing official documentation and grants, as well as referrals to other organisations. In addition, we are also able to assist a limited number of children with school fees, uniforms and stationery. Makhosi assists with a weekly support group for HIV positive mothers and has gradually built on her skills through ongoing training in counselling, home-based care and assisting children's adherence to ARV therapy. Partnership with organisations such as Zoë-Life, CAST and City Hope is integral to Makhosi's role. TB screening was included from 2016; where children (and ideally the entire household) are asked 5 questions on a quarterly basis and any positive answer results in a referral to the local clinic. The aim being to identify this treatable but serious condition as early as possible to prevent spread within households.

In 2016 the responsibilities of the supervisor and 3 teachers at the Vukukhanye Educare Centre were expanded to include identifying and supporting vulnerable children within Chesterville, as well as conducting TB screening on the children attending the Vukukhanye Educare Centre.



A few stories as reported by our careworkers...

"Syabonga is 5 year-old boy who has lived with his granny since his parents passed away in a car accident. His granny didn't have much to offer and wanted to give him away to one of her relatives. The groceries provided on a monthly basis at least allow Sybonga to have breakfast daily and he is able to stay with his granny."

"Sabelo is a 15 year-old boy who lives with his unemployed single mother and four siblings. His father abandoned him when he was 9. Sabelo is in Grade 10 this year. At least now Sabelo is happy to go home from school knowing he'll have something to eat when he gets

"Nompilo is a ten month-old girl, cared for by her granny since her mother passed away while giving birth to her. Nompilo's granny didn't know what to do when she became the primary caregiver. We were fortunately able to assist with infant formula on a monthly basis."

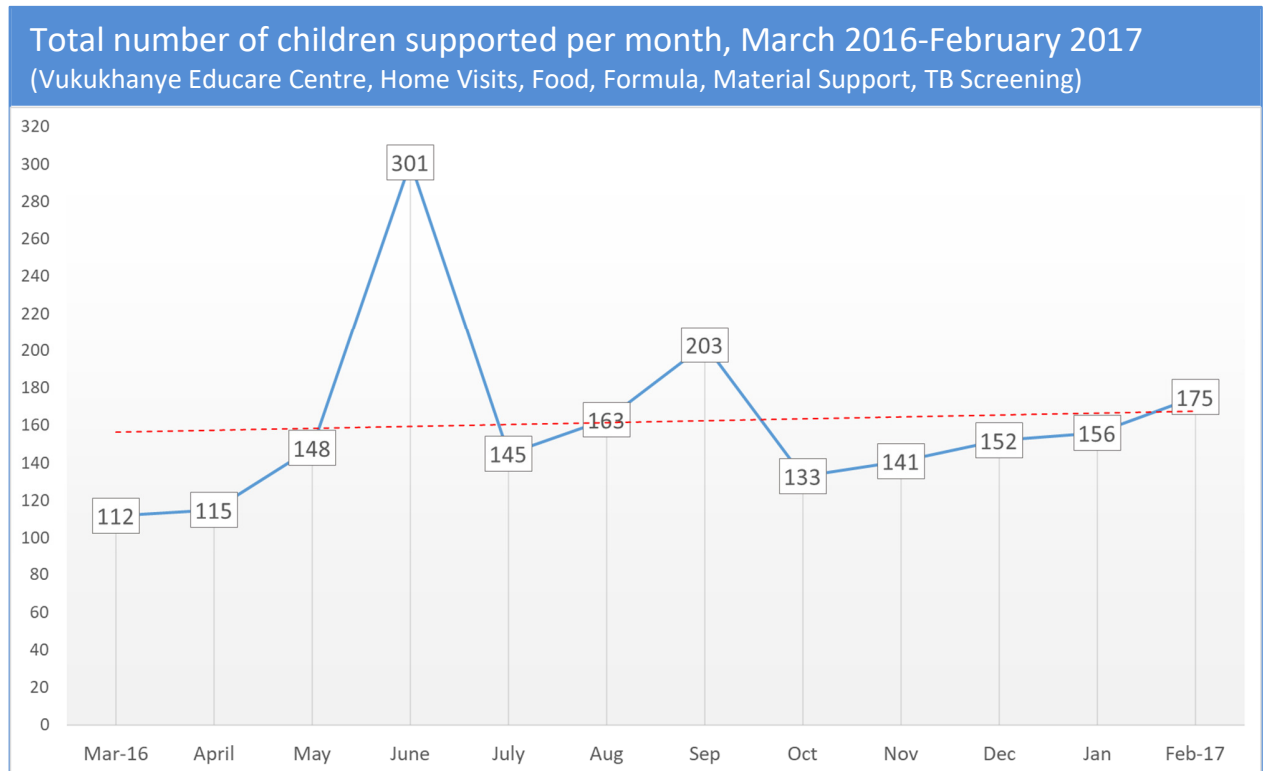
"Wandile (a 20 month-old boy) lives with his grandmother, after being abandoned by his mother at 3 months old. The family does not receive a child support grant. Support from Starfish allows us to assist with food and consumables, which is a great help as the little money the granny has is needed for baby formula and nappies."

"Thabiso and Lwazi live with their grandparents after their mother left them with their unemployed father, who is unable to care for them. They are very grateful for the groceries provided and at least they have some toiletries and are now able to brush their teeth every morning."

"Luvuyo is an 11 year-old boy who has lived with his uncle since his mother passed away. They are so happy to receive groceries as his uncle is not employed and only earns from the occasional part-time job."

Support of orphans and vulnerable children (OVC Programme)

Funding received from The Starfish Greathearts Foundation enabled Vukukhanye to continue with the OVC Programme in 2016, specifically targeting children 0-18 years old. This programme, which has been funded by the Starfish Greathearts Foundation since 2009, includes children living in Chesterville as well as those enrolled at the Vukukhanye Educare Centre (where children also receive breakfast and lunch daily). The graph below reflects the total number of children who received at least one support service in the months March 2016 to February 2017. An average of 162 children were assisted on a monthly basis.

Vukukhanye’s partnership with Suncoast includes regular in-kind donations from their “Helping Hands Box” as well as monthly staff visits to support preschools, schools, the elderly and disabled and other community-based projects in Chesterville. The monthly initiatives during the period April 2016 to March 2017 are listed below...

March 2016 – Easter at Vukukhanye Educare Centre



April 2016 – painting the Ekuthuleni Educare Centre



The Ekuthuleni Educare Centre in Chesterville Extension 1 enrolls 250 children. Suncoast has visited and provided support on a number of occasions over the last few years and visited again in April 2016 to paint much of the outside and inside of the classrooms.

May 2016 – Africa Day drumming at Nsimbini Primary School

All Grade 7 learners at Nsimbini Primary School were included in this exciting event, where children were divided into groups of 20 and lead in drumming circles, using African Djembe drums. The opportunity was used to educate learners on the significance of Africa Day.

June 2016 – ‘Youth Day’, Suncoast outing for Golden Gateway Special School

45 Learners from Golden Gateway Special School in Umkhumbane were transported to Suncoast, where they were treated to a movie and lunch.



July 2016 – ‘Mandela Day’ soup-kitchen in Chesterville

Suncoast staff provided soup and rolls to 300 residents of the Chesterville Extension 3 area. Blankets and clothing were also distributed to two local Children’s Foster Homes.

August 2016 – ‘Women’s Day’ Breakfast at Suncoast

Twenty caregivers from Chesterville were treated to breakfast at Suncoast Hotel and Towers.

September 2016 – Vegetable garden at Ngilonde Centre

Suncoast staff, including the Landscaping Team, provided vegetable seedlings and seeds to the Ngilonde Centre in Chesterville, and spent the morning preparing beds and planting seedlings. This centre feeds vulnerable children from local schools on a daily basis and the vegetables harvested from this garden will be used to supplement meals provided to these children.



October 2016 – Cancer Awareness Month

In partnership with Suncoast, Vukukhanye and the Department of Health Chesterville Clinic; staff of the Cancer Association of South Africa (CANSA) went to the Chesterville Clinic on three occasions to provide the following services...



- Clinical Breast Examination (CBE) of 50 ladies, as well as showing ladies how to perform self-examinations
- Pap smears (50 ladies)
- Lifestyle Risk assessments (50 ladies) – based on diet, exercise etc.
- Education on cancer prevention and warning signs of some common cancers.

November 2016 – Food parcel distribution

Food parcels and blankets were distributed to vulnerable people and families as identified by community leaders. This was in a temporary accommodation area in Ridgeview.



December 2016 – Christmas party at Zamokuhle Crèche

The children at Zamokuhle Crèche, as well as children from Ridgeview temporary accommodation settlement, were treated to a Christmas party with lots of fun, music, dancing, gifts and snacks.



January 2017 – School stationery and bags to Christopher Nxumalo Primary

School bags and stationery was provided to 30 learners at Christopher Nxumalo Primary School. Learners in need were selected by the school staff.



February 2017 – Valentine's Day Tea for Muthande Society for the Aged.

Muthande Society for the Aged provides supportive services to the elderly, including at their service centre in central Chesterville. Suncoast has visited a number of times over the years and again made a difference to the elderly by providing an amazing Valentine's Day Tea, including cake and other treats.

3. FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

3.1 Treasurer's Report – February 2017


Another year has passed and Vukukhanye continues to fulfil its mandate of providing services to orphans and vulnerable children. We are again grateful to all the faithful and loyal supporters of Vukukhanye; without whom Vukukhanye would not exist. Thank you for your continued support. We are still primarily involved in the following activities: 1) The Foster Home at 7 Bristol Road, Westville, 2) The Vukukhanye Educare Centre, 3) Welfare Support in Chesterville and 4) Education Bursaries.

For the year under review Donor income increased over the previous by some R 62 293 (5.6%) which is encouraging as we are in difficult economic times. Expenses decreased by R 83 398 (7.9%) which is commendable in an environment of significant cost increments. This resulted in a surplus of R 44 343 (2016: Deficit R 99 921). Thank you to the management of Vukukhanye for continuing to invite new donors to assist with the finances whilst keeping the overheads in check. The following expense items were the larger movements both in increases and decreases:

- Employee Costs: Increase of R35 246 (6.6%) - *Increased stipends for ECD staff and teachers' assistants*
- Medical Expenses: Increase of R 25 830 (45.1%) - *Realignment of medical aid cost previously incorrectly allocated.*
- Repairs and Maintenance: Decrease of R 60 465 (70.3%) - *Less work required at Vukukhanye Educare Centre and some Foster Home projects done by Rotary.*
- School Expenses: Decrease of R 28 986 (48.1%) - *Foster Home Grade 8 & 9 school fees paid for by Rotary, one less child at Foster Home. Two school bursars matriculated.*
- Tertiary Education: Decrease of R 65 664 (45.8%) - *A tertiary student qualified and one had tertiary education delayed for a year. Timing of fees for two new tertiary bursars (paid after 28 February 2017).*
- Utilities: Increase of R 16 292 (41.4%) - *Rates (Foster Home) has now been included into Utilities expense line; high Eskom tariffs.*

The focus for 2018 financial year will continue to be on our core items above and ensure they function with excellence, as they currently do. Further we will continue to look for new donors and supporters to ensure the sustainability of Vukukhanye into the future.

We again thank our faithful donors and supporters, whose continued donation of finances and time is greatly appreciated and we look forward to your support going forward.
